The Rev. Kay M. Hollinger

The Rev. Kay M. (Miller) Hollinger, 85, of East Norriton, PA peacefully passed away at home on Hospice surrounded by family on Saturday, December 10, 2022.

To be noted she was Associate Pastor a Grace Lutheran Royersford where she was the founder of the Clowns of Grace, co-founder of the Interdenominational Clergy Energy Council, treasurer for Project Outreach and Royersford Food Pantry Coordinator. She became the Associate Pastor at Grace Lutheran Norristown. She served the Southeastern Pennsylvania Synod as a specially trained Interim Pastor at several local churches including Saint Marks Lutheran Church, Conshohocken, Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, Plymouth Meeting, and Saint Paul's Lutheran Church, Norristown.

Upon retirement, she continued her service to the community becoming the Charter President of Kiwanis Club of Norristown, Pa, a member of the Red Hat Association, and continued her crochet club at St Paul's Lutheran Church. The Rev. John Stevens Kerr

Rev. John Stevens Kerr, 86, passed away peacefully with family by his side on November 30,2022 in Exton, Pennsylvania. John was born on March 18, 1936, in Salt Lake City, Utah, the only child of the late David Cessford Kerr and Connie (nee Guy) Kerr.

John grew up in Los Angeles, CA. As a young man he enjoyed photography, astronomy and even obtained a pilot's license at age 14. He was active in Luther League activities where he attended UCLA and studied political science. John and Joanne married in 1959 while he was attending Pacific

Lutheran Theological Seminary in Berkeley, CA, where he received a Master's of Divinity degree.

John began his 62 year-long career in ministry by starting and establishing a church, Shepherd of the Valley in Spring Valley, California. The church building and the initial growth of the congregation was overseen by young John while his wife, Joanne, was organist and choir director. On the side, he began writing for religious publications. It wasn't long before the Lutheran Church in America noticed his talents and invited him to join their publishing headquarters located in Philadelphia, PA. John took a leap of faith in 1966 and moved his young family to the east coast.

John was soon promoted to Senior Editor of Youth and Leadership Resources at the Division of Parish Services for the Lutheran Church in America. For over 20 years he developed and edited resources for the church curriculums while also working as a supply pastor. He authored 4 books. A gifted writer, he joined Genesis Communications in the 1990's to work on public relations materials for various nonprofits and churches. He continued freelance work with KenCrest and the American Bible Society. In the late 1990's he worked to structure and establish the role of Interim Minister for Lutheran churches who were in transition between their full-time pastors. John became an interim minister and enjoyed over 20 active years serving numerous congregations in the southeastern Pennsylvania area. His sense of humor and ability to relate to people, along with his unique preaching style, was met with great appreciation from the congregations. He was an active pastor up until his passing, having served most recently as copastor at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Norristown, PA. During this time John was also

Executive Director of Lutheran Bible Ministries and developed a lectionary series as a learning tool for bible study.

John was an avid reader and was often surrounded by mounds of reading materials, along with a cup of coffee. Very curious and an intellectual on many levels, he explored a variety of topics. He had a relaxed manner and was extremely good-natured with a quirky humor. He traveled extensively and loved to cook and try new foods. He was a loving husband, adored by his children and became the "cool" grandpa to his grandkids whom he baptized. He was an active citizen and community leader having served on the local Democratic Party Committee. He was also an active member and leader at his home church for 56 years, Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in King of Prussia, PA.

Rev. Carol Ann Steinhart, 80, of Gaithersburg, MD, completed her baptism in death on April 19, 2022. Carol was born in Bloomsburg, PA on August 23, 1941, the daughter of the late James Edmond and Betty Arlene (Harris) Edwards.

A 1959 graduate of Bloomsburg State University in Pennsylvania with a bachelor's degree in education, Carol did her post-graduate studies in reading psychology at Rutgers University and Pennsylvania State University.

Carol had successful careers as an English teacher in Neshaminy Senior High School, a stay-at-home Mom raising two children, and the Parish Admin/Secretary for Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Hershey, PA prior to going into ministry.

In 1996 she graduated from the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia with a Master of Divinity degree. Rev. Steinhart's first call was as pastor to St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Abington, MA. In 2003, Rev. Steinhart was the interim pastor to Emanuel Lutheran Church in Manchester, CT. The following year she was called by Reformation Evangelical Lutheran Church in Media, PA to be the Chaplain at Elwyn, a care facility for children and adults with autism, intellectual and developmental disabilities, and related behavioral health challenges. She retired from active ministry in February 2011.

As a mom, Carol was very active in volunteer work. She was president of the Hershey Parent Teachers Association, a leader in the Women of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America (LCA/LCW at the time), Vietnamese Resettlement Coordinator, Board of Director for Tressler Lutheran Social Services, newsletter editor for multiple groups, Director of Summer Vacation Bible School, Co-Director for the musical Godspell in a town production, election poll volunteer, and much more. She was known for her ability to organize church events for dozens or hundreds of people, and she planned synod and youth retreats. For her children, she always found time to make smiley-face cupcakes for the first day of school every single year and other fun traditions.

She is survived by her children, Shelley L. Stall (Alexander) of Boyds, MD, and William E. Steinhart III (Tammy) of Lancaster, PA, and grandchildren, Alexander, Edward, Laura, Timothy, Katelyn, and Benjamin; brothers James Edwards and his children Lisa and Jeff, and Michael Edwards (Millie) and their son Michael.

Carol is also survived by her best friend Rev. Patricia Johnson, with whom she has lived with for the last 30 years. Pat's family embraces Carol as their own including daughter Katrina, her husband Tim Donoughue, and their children Alexander, Mitchell, and Kevin.

The Rev. Dr. Richard Nelson Stewart

Dr. Richard N. Stewart, Associate Professor Emeritus, who taught communications and parish administration for nearly three decades at the former Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia (now United Lutheran Seminary), died in his Philadelphia home on November 13 after a long illness. He was 78.

Born in Toledo, OH, of parents connected to the African American Episcopal and Baptist traditions, Stewart became attracted to the Lutheran Church when his father, Paul, was engaged to become the church musician for Ascension Lutheran Church in Toledo. Stewart went on to become President of the Luther League statewide in Ohio. He thus became a close part of a Lutheran Church in America denominational tradition not always popular with Blacks of his day. As a professor, Stewart taught rostered leaders in training about the essential aspects of communications, also how to be effective administrators of congregations they would later lead and the role of administration in providing good pastoral care.

As himself a student and researcher of African American Lutheran history, Stewart also possessed a distinctive pastoral style. His concern for students went well beyond the classroom. He and a close colleague, the Rev. Dr. Charles Leonard, made it a regular practice to attend the ordination rites and other celebrations of many students, sometimes involving far-flung travel. Stewart's "spare-time" devotion to those students frequently went beneath the radar. He was an expressive and effective preacher with a gentle sense of humor.

Stewart held a lifelong fascination for radio, television, and technology. Before the positions of Information Technology and Instructional Design directors became vogue at schools, Stewart served as a crucial, early bridge to those fields at the seminary. He ran the school's fledgling media center, engaging in the practice of interviewing seminarians and overseeing the recording of special events like "Preaching with Power." That decades-old annual March activity features week-long appearances of nationally noted Black preachers in support of the seminary's Urban Theological Institute, an initiative that has sought to expand the training of African American pastors throughout the Delaware Valley. In this bridge capacity, Stewart was an early advisor to seminary planners on how to make best use of technology in designing the Brossman Center, the Seminary's first building devoted to classroom teaching.

Stewart met his future spouse, Dawn C. Cartee, at Wittenberg University, Springfield, OH, where both were students. Stewart graduated from Wittenberg with a BA in Sociology in 1967. He received his Master of Divinity degree from Hamma School of Theology in Springfield in 1971, becoming ordained in the Lutheran Church in America (a predecessor body of the current Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) in 1971. Following his ordination, Stewart became assistant pastor of Westwood Lutheran Church, Dayton, OH (1971-1973); served as a consultant to Urban Crisis, Inc., Atlanta, GA (1970-1974); Chaplain for the Dayton (OH) Rehabilitation Center (1972-1973), and worked as Director, Inter-Faith Campus Ministry, Central State University, Wilberforce, OH (1973-1983).

From 1983 to 1989 Stewart was pastor of Lord God of Sabaoth Lutheran Church in Christiansted, St. Croix in the Virgin Islands, a congregation that is more than 200 years old. In 1989 he joined the Seminary faculty as part of its Black Scholars Initiative. At the same time, he engaged in studies at Temple University where he completed all of the course work for the PhD but was unable to finish the dissertation. While at the Seminary, Stewart earned a DMin Degree. In retirement, he served for a time as an interim pastor at his home church, Christ Lutheran Community Church in Upper Darby, PA.

Stewart served on numerous church and synodically-affiliated boards including an eight-year stint on the consulting committee of *The Lutheran* magazine (now entitled *Living Lutheran*) and twice serving on the Board of Directors for Trinity Lutheran Seminary, Hamma's successor school. Among his community posts, Stewart served on the Xenia, OH, Area Interfaith Council, Tornado Disaster Recovery, as a Board member (1974-1978). He was significantly involved in the Conference of International Black Lutherans (CIBL) and the African Descent Lutheran Association (ADLA). CIBL had a special place in his heart because of his deep desire to create a genuine working relationship between Black Lutheran scholars and church leaders from the Northern Hemisphere and the African Continent. During a six-months sabbatical he taught at the Seminary in Pietermaritzburg, South Africa.

At the time of Stewart's death, he was researching an extensive history depicting the contributions of Africans and African Americans to global and domestic Lutheran traditions. He had conducted scores of recorded interviews in which a variety of key Black leaders described the challenges and opportunities of contributing to those traditions. A group of scholars have committed themselves to completing the work Stewart started.

In addition to Dawn, his widow, Stewart is survived by two sons, Karl, who lives with his spouse, Curtina, in Reno, NV, and Joel of Wyncote, PA.

A Celebration of Life Service was held at 11 a.m. Monday, December 5, at Christ Lutheran Community Church, 7240 Walnut St, Upper Darby, PA 19082.
